### 1. Presentations

Dr. John Pierce – (Associate Vice-Principal and Dean of Student Affairs) I work with a variety of entities on campus and programs for graduate students. I have been working to articulate the programs that we coordinate with graduate students. I have set 5 priorities that are relevant to graduate students:

- 1. Financial stability in student affairs budget cuts, looking at how we can sustain funds for the future.
- 2. Health Council and disability services. Some are supported by student and some government fees. These are facing critical pressures. Health services has some deficits and disability services has sky rocketed and we get government funding for this (not changed) the kind of disabilities that we are seeking to accommodate are more complex.
- 3. Working on programs to improve inclusivity. In the residence programs there are programs such as these. There are more programs for graduate students, faculty and staff. This is a huge area of demand for the diversity and inclusivity programs. This is an essential service that helps to define the university
- 4. Student life centre the Queen's centre. I have been negotiating with all parties. This takes up a lot of time.
- 5. Graduate and professional services as presented by student affairs. I think the programs we offer need to be advertised better. I have been trying to work more closely with SGS to ensure that there is not duplication. How can we maximize the opportunities that graduate students need. I am particularly interested in the graduate life student group.

Anne-Marie Grondin: Glad to hear about diversity and inclusivity. What are the programs?

Dr. John Pierce: Education/skits for training dons, ad-hoc events that Human Rights develop programs for a one-off presentation. I want a plan of a set of programs that deal with identity issues — gender issues and so on. Inside student affairs they had programs going for staff. I am not sure if there are programs that are reaching out specifically to graduate and professional students.

Daniel Moore: There are some interesting ideas for developing queer inclusivity programs. These are typically targeted at undergraduate students but thinking of having something put in place for graduate students.

Dr. John Pierce: Another focus is to educate staff in career services – staff training for dealing with issues faced by graduate students that are different from undergraduate students.

Dr. Thomas Harris: (Vice Principal Advancement) I deal with all the publications and alumni relations which is the non-monetary connecting to graduates. We have fundraising. Advancement does not send fundraising priorities. We are a service to the university and our task is to set out the priorities directed by the principal and keeping in mind the donors. We bring in a million dollars. Almost all donations come from alumni.

We do not engage with people that we do not want to engage with. Before we accept a gift we do a background check to make sure that we do want to partner with this company/organization. Last year we raised 3 million dollars. We are trying to build the Queen's brand and awareness about us. Right now our faculties are developing their priorities. We can advise on what is comfortable and what is not. We are working on a needs assessment and priorities. We raised over 60 million dollars for performing arts. There is an expansion in Goodes Hall, engineering are about expanding the programs. We are expanding to meet the needs of the undergraduate and graduate studies. We will be consulting with graduate students for their needs for recreational sports facilities at west campus. There is a plan for a new building for engineering along with a new building for teaching. Queen's has the largest amount of money for student awards. In the next 30 years we need to add 500 million for endowment funds. We are in the midst of putting our own strategic plan together. We want to know what people think of Queen's. We have a company out of Toronto holding focus groups to get a better picture of how Queen's is seen. We don't talk about the role of how graduate students. My success as a researcher has been built upon the initiative and enthusiasm of my graduate students. Alumni relations has expanded representation to include graduate students. We have included graduate student reps. One of our challenges in advancement is to respond to the need of graduate students as alumni. One of our final goals is to represent the diversity of our graduate students.

Joe Steele: What was the split with endowments?

Dr. Thomas Harris: The queen's endowment is 577 million dollars. We are able to spend out \$1500 per student.

Kalanthe Khaiat: In line with your goal how are you planning to represent diversity?

Dr. Thomas Harris: We do not reflect our graduating student population. We represent graduates of 25 years ago in regards to our donor. Is it possible to understand diversity when we are not very diverse ourselves? We have an educated group of employees. We have the capacity to understand this topic. We are going to have a plan that addresses diversity and inclusivity. We want to know how this is demonstrated in our publications. Do we understand philanthropy in different communities – no. We need to take advantage of the knowledge of our graduate students in order to reflect the needs of our current graduate students.

Kalanthe Khaiat: Do you see the office of advancement working with other diversity organizations on the Queen's campus?

Dr. Thomas Harris: Yes. We are committed to doing this and engaging people that know more about this than we do.

Bruce Griffith: (Manger of hospitality and housing) Regarding the water bottle ban. Bottle water ban – there have been some things that we are doing. Wherever you can find a water fountain you can get distilled water for free if you have a receptacle. Do we have enough water fountains on campus? We need to know if this water is safe when it is travelling through the pipes of our building. We need to do some PR – determine whether there are barriers to implementing this plan. I don't want to miss any steps along the way. There needs to be a gradual implementation. Coke contract – we have been talking to coke for 10 years. The litre and litre and half bottles will be removed from vending machines. Could they take out the water machine and put something else in? I don't think this is widely known about. Campus needs to be prepared. We have to be ready to meet the challenge of people resisting this decision.

Logan Crowell – Is there any concern that we are replacing bottled water with other drinks which makes water harder to find.

Bruce Griffith– The idea is a start. Does have a political cashe.

Iain Reeve – Distilled water is available. Are there attempts to make people aware of this?

Bruce Griffith— need to make people more aware of this. There is the symbol placed by the water fountains. But we do need to increase the PR.

Anne-Marie Grondin— Water accessibility group on campus that have campaigned for open access to water. We could work together with this group to increase PR on campus. You mentioned that water fountains went to disfavour. Do you think it is less demand or that they have been replaced by Disani vending machines. It was rumoured that this was due to the Coke contract.

Bruce Griffith— the coke contract had nothing to do with the fountains being removed. They were removed due to food being dumped down them, ripped off the wall. Also the undergraduate population has not used fountains for their whole life. They were a maintenance night mares and there was concern about the water quality due to older pipes.

Sarah Waurechen – How strict is the ban at events that the principal is not showing up at.

Bruce Griffith— We tell Sodexo what we want. We pay them a fee to deliver that to us. We could say tomorrow that we want to get rid of the bottled water. Over the next couple of years on how to do this. Coke contract is coming to an end. I have basically reformed the same committee structure that recommended the first signing of the contract 10 years ago. Their job is to explore what options that we have around cold beverage. There is still interest with partnering with over companies. Want to make sure that we explore every opportunity. We did have a renewal contract with Coke, but bottled water will not be a part of this arrangement.

Iain Reeve – What would be the key time for people to get involved in this process?

Bruce Griffith— We will be doing a lot more vetting this time around. This will be happening over the next year or so. In the new year you will start to see a lot more.

Stacey Harrison (Occupational Therapy Student) – We are all students in the occupational therapy program at Queen's. We are advocating for occupational therapy to be part of the SGPS student health plan. Students either supported this inclusion or did not have enough information about this form of therapy to make a decision. Our purpose is to promote awareness about the type of services that we offer. OT is to assist with health and well-being. Any meaningful activities that occupy your daily life. Encompasses all activities – what you want to do and what you are expected to do. We do not focus on only changing the

person and providing equipment. We work to assist with changing and adapting one's environment. It could involve us talking with the employers. In the case of this specific student we spoke with professors to adapt her program so that she could work at home, change her exam dates. They made adaptations in order for her to meet her clinical expectations.

Logan Crowell— Did you include people who knew what occupational therapy when tallying the results for people who would be supportive of this being included in our coverage?

OT Representative—We included all respondents to the survey.

Sharon Murphy – (Head of Academic sciences, engineering and sciences library divisions) The purpose is to start a conversation with SGPS. We do have points of contacts. We do introductory workshops at the beginning of the year. We have different relationships with different departments. We do have some relations with graduate students through SGS. We have a new librarian Martha Whitehead. Had a good conversation with Jawad about academic planning and a variety of issues. We discussed with Anne Marie during open access week the copyright issues. One of the issues is the collection that we provide. Every three years called LibQual. We send out a survey to student to elicit your perception of the library across three areas. We had about 1800 respondents last year. 48% were graduate students and from this we were able to determine some of the issues faced by graduate students. The thing that you want most from us is the collection. What we own and what we have access to. In the comments there were some issues that came up such as Queen's library has a weak collection of books in mathematics. That is a very broad statement. We want to talk to those students and know what don't we have and what do you need, how do you need it. One of the reasons we are here is to strengthen this communication. Many comments were like why don't you have this journal and when looking we would determine that we had that journal. We need to learn how to get these resources into your hands. We want to build on a liaison library structure.

Natalie Soini – (Library liaison for social sciences and humanities) Every department has a library liaison. And a library rep for their department. I am a liaison librarian for German. We email to say this is what the department needs and what the students need. We go from that model to the departments, departmental meetings. We can buy things like journals and books. How can we build this relationship? You can go to our website. The liaison librarian is on the page and you can email us to get what you need. You can slo do workshops which is the expanding horizon, how to do info lit review, the faculty panel asking advice. When you are doing your literature review please come to us and tell us what books are required. If we can start the conversation earlier the process will become a lot smoother.

Iain Reeve – Electronic access for collections. How many resources, books, journal online? There are a lot of universities that are accelerating the number of resources online – where are we this? Have you ever thought about increasing library tutorials into curriculum.

Natalie Soini – We do meet with the students at the beginning of the year with a workshop. We do contact the department to make sure that they know who we are. The bulk of our teaching is going into the departments.

Sharon Murphy – We do consultations one on one with graduate students to talk about sources, the management of the information to make sure that you are handling the information an efficient way. The reception of the department really varies. If you would support this within your department this would be very helpful. Our journal collection is predominantly online.

Jonathan Foster – Advertising that you go into departments and ask supervisors to tell graduate students to go and meet with the librarian.

Brittany Sargent – Having a challenge trying to access journal articles. There is a high cost associated with accessing journal articles with Racer.

Sharon – The fee issue has come up a variety of times. The fee is going to be staying. It can range up to \$150 for us to access a journal article for you. This is a highly subsidized process. It is driven for us by budget. We have had a staff reduction of %20 over the past three years.

Anne-Marie Grondin – We create extensive lists when doing our comprehensive exams and literature reviews. Would you be amenable sending our literature reviews and list of authors that we use. We have used a collection tool that scans the published literature of faculty on campus. We would need to have something that would feed digitally into the database.

Hannah Legh-Jones – Concerns in the library are graduate study space. There are currently 12 seats in the graduate area in Stauffer. Is there any chance to get access to this space during exams.

Sharon Murphy – This is an issue that we are talking about. We are over the next few years embarking on a space plan in the library. It really seems to depend on what departments you talk to. Do you want something that is quiet or that bans undergraduate students?

Daniel Moore – Private carrels.

Hannah Legh-Jones – Only if you didn't have a study space allotted to you were you allowed to get a corral.

Natalie Soini – This should not be the case.

Sharon Murphy – There are study spaces at the top of Douglas.

Ricardo Vidal – (Mendeley reference software) Presents Powerpoint presentation. Available on SGPS website.

Daniel Moore – How would it compare to Jstore?

Ricardo Vidal – You can go onto the website and look at the statistics to look at the entire library. You can get general stats on the whole website and can tell you users by discipline. You can get your own library stats.

Ryan McInerney— What about copyright?
